The Money Week website provides resources to start conversations about money, as well as other tools and resources for adults and young people.

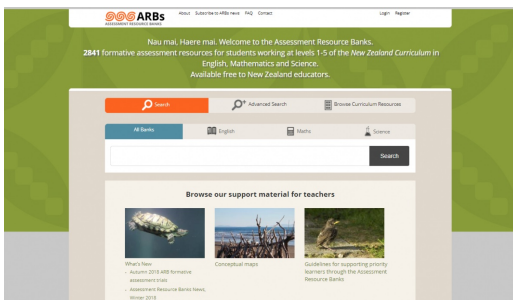

Selection of ARBs

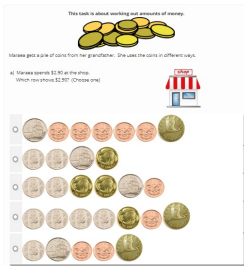

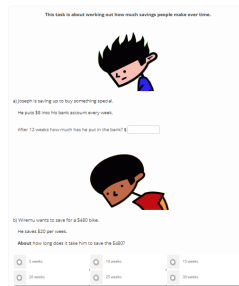

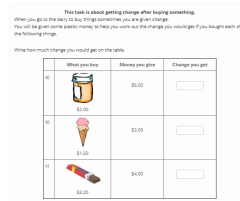
