ARB conservation resources mostly involve the Living World context and include the science capabilities: *Gather and interpret data* and *Engage with science*.


Conservation of plants and animals is all about being aware of the actions that help solve problems or issues when change happens. It requires knowing about the adaptations plants and animals have that help them survive when there is a change in their habitat.

### Rubbish on the beach

This task is about looking carefully and thinking about the things you see.


Here is a photograph of a beach.



a) Look carefully at the photo. Make a list of things you can see that **belong** on this beach.


### Kererū II

This task is about using what we know about kererū's adaptations to help us decide on actions to help the species survive.




The gape of a bird is how wide it can open its beak. Native trees such as karaka, tawa and tarairua produce large fruit.

Here is a drawing of a waka kererū, which was used to trap kererū. The trap was filled with water and placed near trees when they had berries on them.



### A mystery photo

This task is about observation skills and finding clues to solve the mystery behind a photo.



a) i) Look carefully at this photo. List all the things you can see.

The Assessment Resource Banks (ARBs) can be used to explore a range of conservation topics.
