Principle 1

While assessment resources acknowledge the diverse traditions of Pacific people, they should also reflect their interests, values and aspirations as participants in the contemporary world.

Principle 3

Assessment tasks provide opportunities for diverse Pacific learners to draw on the experiences and knowledge they bring to the learning environment.

Principle 4

Assessment tasks foster in diverse Pacific learners a culture of "I can learn", "I love learning" and "I can be successful".
